SCIENCE: 

In Science, pupils will be learning the second part of our unit all about Properties of Materials.

MFL: SPANISH 


School pupils are learning new vocabulary on school subjects, adjectives, school items, facilities...

**ART:** 

Space Art- Children are learning to use composition, perspective and proportion to create a sense of depth and balance in their space-themed artwork. They are exploring the work of Lucien Rudaux and Alexei Leonov to understand how scientific observation and personal experience can inspire creative pieces.

MUSIC: 


In Music, pupils will reflect, rewind and replay the skills they have developed over the year. They will create a final performance piece.

PE: 

Tennis: Learning the different strokes and techniques to play matches.
Striking and fielding: a mixture of cricket and rounders.

**RE:** 


The pupils will be learning about freedom and justice.

PSHE: 

Pupils will continue to learn about positive relationships and what they should expect from the friendships they make. Time will also be allocated to discuss the transition to Year 6 and what expectations there will be next year.

COMPUTING: 

Online safety, using apps safely online.

ENGLISH: **Reading:**


We will be reading longer texts to develop our stamina for reading and using our skills developed throughout the year to further our understanding of them.

Writing: 

We will be using our skills that we have developed throughout the year to write our own fantasy story. Then we will write a non-chronological report based around a mythical creature.

MATHS: 

We will develop essential Year 7 mathematical skills this summer term, focusing on algebra and ratio. Students will learn to form and simplify expressions, solve equations, understand proportional reasoning, and apply ratios to real-life contexts, building confidence, accuracy, and problem-solving fluency across a range of engaging activities and collaborative tasks.

History: 

We will be judge, jury and executioner as we travel through the ages and explore the various crimes and punishments that existed in History.

Year 6 Curriculum Overview Summer 2 2026



Thank you for your continued support.

SCIENCE: 


Year 6 pupils will learn how simple electrical circuits work by building their own using different components. They will explore how changing parts of a circuit affects how well things like bulbs and buzzers work. Pupils will also learn about safety and use their knowledge to create their own simple electrical projects.

MFL: SPANISH

Home and town: pupils are learning new vocabulary to describe their home and town.

**DT:** 

Year 6 will be designing and constructing model Ancient Greek theatres using junk modelling materials, exploring how these structures were carefully designed for performances.

MUSIC: 

In music, pupils will be working on an end of project performance, tying together their learning from across the year.

PE: 

Tennis: Learning the different strokes and techniques to play matches. Striking and fielding: a mixture of cricket and rounders.

PSHE: 

Positive relationships and understanding of the emotional changes they will go through as they develop. They will also consider the transition to KS3 and the expectations in Year 7.

RE: 

Pupils will deepen their understanding of the concept of God by exploring it in both local and global contexts. They will learn about the growing number of people with no religious belief and confidently use terms like atheist, agnostic, and theist.

Online Safety - Analysing reliable and fake news sources.

Wild school holiday fun



Don't get bored in the school holidays - try our fun nature activities instead!



Make a nectar bar

No matter how big or small your space, there's a lot you can do to help our insects!

1. You'll need a window box (or two if you've got space) with drainage holes.
2. Use peat free compost in your window box.
3. Stock up on pollinator-friendly plants that are suitable for window boxes. Chose from lavender, thyme, sage, agrimony and rosemary.
4. Water regularly throughout the summer!



Make a butterfly painting

You will need water-based paints, brushes, sugar paper, marker pen and plenty of newspaper to cover your table.

1. Fold a piece of sugar paper in half (as if making a card) and open it back out.
2. Paint the shape of butterfly wings on one half. Fold the paper over again and press down.
3. Open out the paper and add more colours to one side. Refold and press.
4. When the butterfly wings are dry, add a body and antennae with a marker pen.



How to build a mini wildlife pond



You will need:

- a watertight container?
- old bricks, rocks and pebbles
- pond plants
- spade

- 1 Choose a spot. Your pond will need light, but not full sunlight all day. You can dig a hole and sink your container, or just leave it sitting on top.
- 2 If the container isn't watertight, e.g. an old plant pot, then add a piece of pond liner.
- 3 Add a layer of gravel and rocks.
- 4 Fill your pond with rainwater (tap water contains chemicals).
- 5 Start planting... you only need two or three plants.
- 6 Now watch and wait! Wildlife will come to your pond of its own accord.

Don't introduce frogs, fish or even water from another pond as this can spread disease.

Music Lessons with Severn Arts

Instrumental and Vocal tuition in school - 2025-26



Severn Arts provides music tuition in your school. If your child would like to continue learning an instrument* or is interested in starting, tuition should be booked directly with Severn Arts. Invoices will be issued three weeks before the start of each term and payment is due before lessons commence.

Tuition is available as 20-minute individual lessons (£16.54/lesson), 30-minute individual lessons (£24.81/lesson) or small group tuition (£8.27/lesson, pays for the 10 min portion of 2 sharing a 20 min lesson or 3 sharing a 30 min lesson).

Severn Arts teachers are enhanced DBS checked and have undertaken formalized safeguarding training.

Once you have ordered tuition, Severn Arts will confirm availability and issue an invoice. **Payment is not requested during the booking process but is required before lessons commence.** Severn Arts will agree lesson details with your school.

Please note, **we do not hire guitars** or keyboards, but we may be able to help with these items where students qualify for free hire. 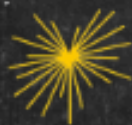

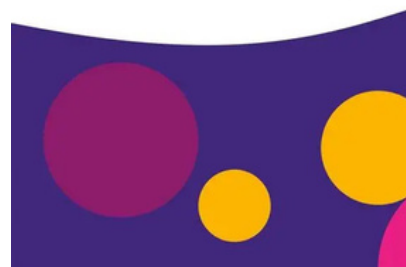
